
A Demonstration

SYNOPSIS

"A Demonstration" is a monster film with no monsters. Inspired by the existence of taxonomies of monsters at the heart of early modern European science, the film explores and reinterprets a way of seeing the natural world that is almost impossible to imagine from today's vantage point. Early Modern naturalists were guided by a logic in which truths were discovered through visual analogy. The word 'monster' comes from the latin 'monstrare', meaning to show, to reveal, to demonstrate.

"A Demonstration" picks up on these themes in a poetic exploration of the boundaries of sight and the metamorphosis of form.

DIRECTORS' BIOGRAPHIES

Sasha Litvintseva (Murmansk, Russia, 1989) is an artist filmmaker and writer researcher, whose work is situated on the uncertain thresholds of the perceptible and the communicable, organism and environment, entropy and quantification.

Her work has been exhibited worldwide including solo presentations at Institute of Contemporary Art, London; Berlinische Galerie, Modern Art Museum Berlin; Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago; Union Docs, New York; screenings including at the Berlinale, Rotterdam, Courtisane, Cinema Du Reel, RIDM, Ann Arbor, Alchemy film festivals; and group presentations at MUMOK Vienna, Moscow Museum of Modern Art, Sonic Acts, Berlin Atonal and the Videobrasil, Moscow Young Art and Wroclaw Media Art biennales, among many others.

Sasha is a lecturer in Film Theory and Practice at Queen Mary University of London and holds a PhD in Media, Communications and Cultural Studies from Goldsmiths. Her writing has appeared in special issues of Environmental Humanities and Transformations journals, and numerous book volumes.

Beny Wagner (Berlin, Germany, 1985) is an artist, filmmaker and writer. Working in moving image, text, installation and lectures, he constructs non-linear narratives which investigate the ever shifting boundaries of the human body.

He has presented his work in festivals, exhibitions and conferences internationally: International Film Festival Rotterdam, Eye Film Museum, Media Art Biennale WRO, Sonic Acts, Haus der Kulturen der Welt, 5th and 6th Moscow Biennale for Young Art, Moscow International Experimental Film Festival, Impakt Festival, Berlin Atonal, Venice Biennale, Import Projects, Future Gallery, White Columns among many others. His work has been featured in Artforum, Spike Magazine Quarterly, Frieze Magazine, Kaleidoscope Press, Flash Art and Die Zeit. His writing has been published in Valiz and Sonic Acts Press among others.

Wagner is a PhD candidate at the Archaeologies of Media and Technology Research Group at Winchester School of Art, Southampton University and was a researcher at Jan van Eyck Academy in 2015-6. He is currently a senior lecturer at Gerrit Rietveld Academy, Amsterdam.
